The basis for this service is connected vehicles, monitored through the Scania Fleet Management system with vehicle servicing performed at Scania's 1,200 connected workshops. With nearly 100,000 active Flexible Maintenance contracts for trucks throughout the world, Scania benefits from this experience in shaping the new service for buses and coaches.
